BOILER EXPLOSION.

Four Persons killed and Fifteen Seriously Injured in an Accident at Providence, R. I.

Providence, R. I., Feb. 4.—Patrick Hehr, 50 years of age, and his cousin, John Hehr, 35 years of age, Michael Derry, and William Morton, a boy, were killed, and fifteen injured by the explosion of a boiler at East Carpenter & Son's ice houses at Mashaugung this morning.

The time there were 100 men standing about the engine house waiting for orders to begin harvesting. The first cake of ice had been carried ten feet on the run when the endless chain caught and at the same instant the boiler exploded.

Most of it has been covered in these dispatches, except a letter from Minister Thurston to Secretary Gresham, in which the department of state is instructed that in case of further earthquakes at Honolulu, which are deemed highly probable, the Hawaiian government will be unable to protect foreigners who may be on the island.
