## DESPERADO MURDERED.

Dr. Rader, Who Killed His Brother Murderer, Is Himself Slain. By the United Press.

Lexington, Ky., Feb. 8.-Dr. J. E. Rader, a mountain desperado, was murdered in Breathitt county last night, near Jackson. This morning his dead body was found in the house of Widow "Cot" McQuinn, There were two bullet holes through his heart. The widow said she did the shooting, but would give no reason for it. A BIG SUIT AT NEW ROCHELLE

The Other Heirs Are Three Step-Sisters Who llad Peculiarities of Their

New York, Feb. 8.-General Daniel E. Sickles has just brought suit at New Rochelle for the partition of his father's large estate. The heirs are the general himself, who is the only child of his father's first marriage, and the three children of his father's second marriage-Mrs. George Mead, Mrs. Thomas Quinn and Mrs. James Din-

It is a friendly suit, and the bringing of it at this time is caused by the com ing of age of Mrs. Dinham, the youngest of the heirs. The amount involved is about \$250,000, invested in twenty parcels of land, including 200 acres at New

Rochelle. Old George Sickles, the father of the general, had three daughters by his housekeeper, Mrs. Sawyer, a widow. When he was 81 years old he married her in great state in New York city, the three daughters, thus legitimatized, acting as bridesmaids.

Their Matrimonial Ventures. These three had peculiarities of their own. Roma, the eldest, eloped with George Mead, a butcher boy, the son of the Sickles family's washwoman. Peric, the second daughter, eloped with Thomas Quinn, almost as obscure as Mr. Mead. Last of all came Alta, eloping at 16 with Jimmie Dinham, a bar-

General Sickles has never had anything to do with his stepmother's daughters, nor have his children by his dead first wife, nor his children by his second wife, who lives in Spain, any acquaintance with them. One of these children, by the way, eloped and married a young man named McCarthy, in Paris.

A good part of the property has been held ever since Mrs. Sawyer Sickles died, a few years after her husband. was thirty-three years younger than her husband.

The heirs agreed that Mrs. Sawyer Sickles should have the income of the property until she died, and that as soon as she was dead and the younger of her children were of age, they would divide the estate by a friendly suit.


