New York, Feb. 21-A cheerful feeling characterized the dealings at the Stock exchange, but, as on previous days of the week, the volume of business was small. Today the trading aggregated 125,215 shares, the Industrials nonopolizing the bulk of the business Some wide changes were noted, especially in Tobacco, Lead and Bay State Gas. The first named advanced % to 88%, dropped to 84%, and later railied to 87% and 87%. The decline was attributed to liquidations by local insiders. Lead rose 1 to 29% and dropped to 27% on the announcement that action on the dividend on the common had been deferred until the dividend on preferred is earned in 1895.
