Compiled for Scranton Tribune. One of the most stringent election reform bills framed this winter is that which Representative Kincheloe has introduced in the Illinois legislature. It provides that it shall be unlawful for any person being a candidate for nomination or election to any office under the laws of that state to loan, pay or give or promise to loan, pay or give any money or other thing of value to any delegate or elector or other person for the purpose of securing or influencing the vote of such delegate or elector, or of any other person in aid of the nomination or election of such candidate for the office for which he is a candidate, or in aid of the election of a delegate to any nominating convention before which he may be a candidate. It is also made unlawful for any other person to pay, loan or promise any money or other thing of value to secure votes, services or influence in behalf of such candidate. The practice commonly called "treating" is declared to be "thing of value" within the meaning of this act. Any person violating these provisions shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$20 nor more than \$200, and upon conviction shall be disfranchised and disqualified to hold any office of profit or trust for a period of four years, and if holding any such office under the laws of this state the office shall become vacant. It is further made unlawful for any person to solicit from any candidate money or other thing of value in consideration for the vote.

A bill making it a penal offense in any officer of the state, county or city to accept a railroad pass was recently killed by the Indiana legislature.

To Restore Capital Punishment. There are two bills before the Michigan legislature providing for the restoration of capital punishment for the crime of murder in that state. Representative Fuller's bill provides that all murders which shall be perpetrated by means of poison, or lying in wait, or any other kind of wilful, deliberate and premeditated killing, or which shall be committed in the perpetration or attempt to commit arson, rape, robbery or burglary, shall be deemed murder of the first degree, and shall be punished by death. But no sentence of death is to be imposed where conviction is had wholly upon circumstantial evidence. Such cases are to be punished by life imprisonment. The method by which persons shall be executed is not mentioned. There is believed to be a strong sentiment in the legislature in favor of the death penal-

The Ozmun civil service bill now be fore the Minnesota legislature is occasioning considerable discussion, but of course will not pass. The bill provides that hereafter the "public service" shall be the civil service of the state and the cities, and that all appointments and promotions in the service shall be made according to merit and fitness, irrespective of political or religious affiliations. Within thirty days after the passage of the act the governor is required to appoint three persons as civil service commissioners. one of whom shall serve for two years. another four years, and the third six years, and, after the first appointments the terms shall be for six years, the term of one commissioner expiring every two years. The commissioner are allowed to hold no other public place, and are expected to devote their time to the duties of the office. Not more than two members of the commission shall be members of the same
