HE WILL GO UP HIGHER

Col. Ripple Resigned His Position as Commander of Thirtieth.

NOW IN HANDS OF GOVERNOR

Latter Is Not Disposed to Release the Colonel from National Guard Duty and Will Make Him Commissary General—Maj. Warren Surprised.

The information conveyed in The Tribune's dispatches from Harrisburg yesterday that Colonel E. H. Ripple and Major Everett Warren would be appointed as Governor Hastings staff, former as commissary general and the latter as judge advocate, was received with much pleasure in this city.

In the case of Colonel Ripple, however, regret was expressed that the acceptance of the position of honor to be tendered by the governor would make it necessary for him to retire from the command of the Thirtieth regiment, for which he has done such great service, and which he has brought to its present degree of efficiency. He joined the regiment Aug. 14, 1877, at which time he became captain of Company D. On Oct. 10, 1878, he advanced to major, and on Oct. 10, 1885, to lieutenant colonel. He was made colonel Oct. 10, 1888, and was re-elected to the command Oct. 10, 1893.
