BLAZE ON SOUTH MAIN STREET

Six Thousand Dollars' Worth of Property Goes Up in Smoke-Heroic Work of the Firemen-Accident to a

Ball Player.

Special to the Scranton Tribune. Pittston, March 10.-Fire was discovered in Loughney Bros.' saloon and restaurant, situated on South Main street, at 2.45 this morning. The fire was un-der a good headway when the firemen reached the scene. The Niagaras, Ea-gles and Hook and Ladder companies responded. The Niagaras were the first to reach the plug and in a very short time had two streams on the building. For over two hours our firemen worked hard to save the adjoining property. The fire was confined mostly to the rear of the building, though several times it gainedheadway between the partitions and the flames shot through the roof high into the air. For some time fears were entertained that the occupants had not made their escape, as the smoke was very dense, but it was finally ascertained that there was no one in the burning building. The building being a wooden structure it was com-pletely gutted. The adjoining property was saved only through the heroic efforts of our volunteer fire department. The building was owned by Corcoran Bros., and was insured in Captain John T. Flannery's agency, The stock, owned by Loughney Bros., was also insured in the same agency. The damage to the building will amount to \$5,000, and loss of stock will reach \$1,000.

The Four Beasons hotel, at Middlesboro Ky., was recently bought in by I. Untermyer, of New York, for \$28,000. The original cost was \$1,500,000. It was built when the iron boom hit that section so hard that it turned the heads of capitalists.

Rallroad men say that there is a better feeling in railroad circles, and the out-look for a decided improvement in the freight movement is good. An official of the Pennsylvania railroad company yesterday said there is more demand for cars and that the merchandles being shipped s larger than has been the case for some time. The improvement is not only in the east bound business, but in the west bound as well.
