INDUSTRIAL TOPICS.

There are no new developments in the coal wars.

The puddling department of the plant of the Republic Iron works, at Pittsburg, Pa., has resumed operations, after an idleness of 18 months.

The American Steel Casting company, of Thurston, Pa., has decided to start up the plant at Sharon, Pa., which has been idle more than four years.

The New York, New Haven and Hartford will spend several thousand dollars this year in the abolishing of grade crossings on its lines.

The Pittsburg Reduction company is building an addition to its plant at New Kensington, Pa., consisting of a new iron building and two additional hot mills.

The American Iron works, of New Castle, Pa., has ordered two additional hot mills, while new foundations are being put under the main building.

Greenville, Pa., is considering the project of securing a steel mill. It is to pay a bonus of \$100,000 worth of a site, besides taking \$100,000 worth of first mortgage bonds.

It is said that the Wilkes-Barre and Eastern, leased by the New York, Susquehanna and Western, is soon to double track from Yatesville to Gavel Place, a mile west of Stroudsburg.

Contracts have been let for the buildings and machinery for the extensive addition to be made to the New Castle (Pa.) Steel and Pipe Mill.
