SEVEN YEARS FOR MURDER Sentence Imposed Upon John Sylvester Rostovsky.

WEAPON WAS A BILLIARD CUE Judge Albright, of Allentown, inflicted the Penalty and was Merciful—Pleas for Clemency Made by Attorney's Stanton and O'Brien.

Judge Edwin Albright, of Allentown, sentenced John Sylvester Rostovsky yesterday at noon to a term of seven years' penal servitude in the Eastern penitentiary at Philadelphia for the murder of Joseph Clute, at the Ridge, in Archbald, on Sunday morning, Sept. 17, of last year.
