New York, March 25.-Speculation at the tock exchange was more active than for long time past. Prices moved up and a long time past. Prices moved up and down with great frequency, but the tendency throughout was upward. There was a disposition at one time to accept profits, and this accounts for the irregularity of certain issues like General Electric and Jersey Central. Genoral Electric, for instance, which scored a gain of nearly 8 points last week, advanced about 1 per cent. during the first hour. This brought out long stock and a drop to 37% took place. Subsequently there was a receovery to 37, closing \$\frac{3}{2}\$ lower on the day. Jersey Central started with a gain of 2½ to 18%, then returned to 95%, and railied to 97. Distilling was another stock on which the effect of realizations was noted. Chicago Gas was weak and fell from 73 to 71. Sugar advanced from 98% to 1914, and reacted to 100%. The anthractic coalers were taken on reports that the presidents at a meeting on Thursday will adopt measures to strengthen prices. It is also belived that allotments will be decided upon. Among the bituminous coalers Hocking Valley roze 1½ to 28%. The Cordage stocks advanced rapidly. Speculation closed firm with prices anywhere from \(\frac{1}{2} \) to 1\(\frac{1}{2} \) per cent. higher on the day. Chicago Gas, General Electric and Distillers lost \(\frac{1}{2} \) to transactions aggregated 337,000 shares.
