SUIT AGAINST MR. MEARS. Receivers of Pottsville Iron Company

Want to Recover. John A. Mears and the receivers of the Pottsville Iron company have been unable to come to an understanding about the iron furnished for Mr. Mears' new building now in course of erection at the corner of Washington avenue and Spruce street. As a result of the present difficulty Receivers William Atkins and S. B. Briscoe, through Attorney S. B. Price, have begun action to recover \$14,000.

The iron frame of the building was to have been finished last September, but only two stories have been erected and Mr. Mears' contends, that, aside from the delay, he has been put to great expense by the unworkmanlike manner in which the Iron was fitted and joined. He says that the line of posts at the northwest corner is 1% inches out of plumb at the bottom, that many of the ams are too short and that the iron rods are not according to specification. Several days ago he offered the receivers \$8,000 to withdraw from the contract. The receivers wanted \$10,000

and no agreement was reached. Mr. Mears has solicited bids from other companies and proposes to go on with the work irrespective of the Pottsville contract, which he claims has been made void by the company's tardiness and lax workmanship,
