MYSTERIOUS \$100,000 NOTE

First National Bank Receives It for Collection.

JUDGE HANDLEY'S SIGNATURE

Note Sent from New York by a Man Named Dawson—Is Made Payable to H. S. Pierce, at One Time a Scranton Banker, Now Dead.

Wednesday's mail from New York city brought to Cashier J. A. Linn, of the First National bank on Lackawanna avenue, a letter from a man named Dawson, enclosing a note of \$100,000, purported to have been signed by the late ex-Judge John Handley, in September, 1885, and made payable in ten years. Cashier Linn was instructed to collect the note and yesterday afternoon he handed the paper to Attorney Lemuel Amerman, John T. Richards and ex-Attorney General Palmer, of Wilkes-Barre, executors of the estate. They pronounced it a forgery.

By those who know, the statement is made that between Judge Handley and Mr. Pierce there had never been any business dealing, and such knowledge would naturally suggest to the executors that the note had something suspicious about it.
