State Treasury Cannot Stand the Expense This Year.

TREASURER JACKSON'S REPORT

It is Thought That the Decision to Abolish the Outing Will Cause Dissatisfaction in the Guard--As to Final Adjournment.

Harrisburg, April 12--There will be no National Guard encampments this year. The depleted condition of the state treasury demands this. It will be a saving to the commonwealth of at least \$150,000.

Governor Hastings, Lieutenant Governor Lyon, Secretary Rowler, Attorney General McCormick, State Treasurer Jackson, President Pro. Tom. Thomas, of the senate; Speaker Walton, and Chairman Marshall, of the house appropriations committee met together last night at the executive mansion. They discussed the appropriation asked for and State Treasurer Jackson was called upon for a statement.

It was gathered from the statement of Colonel Jackson that a cut of 10 per cent in all appropriations would be necessary. Charitable and penal institutions relying entirely upon the state for support require \$2,322,000 for the next two years.

Will Save the State \$15,000. It was intended this year to have three brigade encampments. The conference has decided that this will be an impossibility.

The total given by Elm church was \$880; Providence Methodist Episcopal church, \$120, and Simpson church \$125. The total for the whole of the conference district was \$5,722.

Mrs. Potter gave a retrospect of the work of the Women's Missionary society and referred to the statement in a Presbyterian report that there were 5,000,000 illiterate white people in the mountainous region of the southern states who were refugees from Britain, and had lived in an exclusive manner generation after generation in those regions. The efforts of the missionaries were such that when the girls returned to their homes, they were so improved that their parents did not recognize them. This was due solely to the Christian influence and uplifting grace of Christ in their hearts. The society was also accomplishing a wonderful work among the Spanish and Indians in New Mexico.

Work Among the Indians. The work among the Indians was one of intense interest. Within the borders of the states there were 320,000 Indians, of whom 200,000 were pagans.

The government of this country had made 367 treaties with these Indians, all of which they had broken. She would not be surprised that the Indians instead of scalping white men occasionally, that they did not scalp every one they met. She claimed that the Indians respected rights of property, and where a good influence had been exercised were tractable and easy of approach.

Mrs. Potter then spoke of the work among the Mormons and the difficulty to be contended with in the superstition and ignorance of the people. She also described Alaska, whose extent represented one-sixth of the area of the United States, and had 1,000 islands, many of them larger than Massachusetts, and yet the Methodist church had done nothing for this immense country except what had been accomplished by the society.

At Chinatown, San Francisco, where they witnessed the blackest and darkest sins and enormous crimes, the society were engaged in converting the Chinese and other foreigners. The
