Appointments for the Year Announced by Bishop Andrews.

THE CASE OF REV. MR. HOGAN

Resolutions Offered by the Prohibition Pastors-Mr. Hogan Takes the Floor on a Question of Privilege-Business of the Closing Sessions.

[Concluded from Page 1.]

had been established with an increase of 508 in membership, bringing up a total of 2,065. Rev. M. D. Fuller, treasurer, reported that the receipts for the year were \$126, expenditures \$80, leaving a balance of \$46.

The committee on education gave an interesting review of the work of the schools in the district and referred in culogistic terms to the spiritual work, and recommended that a special day of prayer be appointed and that a special collection be taken at all the churches to be devoted to the schools. Upon the ecommendation of the committee the following conference visitors were elect-Drew Theological school, Rev. Manley S. Hard and Rev. C. H. Lewing; Syracuse university, Rev. W. H. Pearce and Rev. A. D. Decker; Dickinson college, Rev. George A. Cure and Rev. William Edgar; Women's College of Baltimore, Rev. L. C. Floyd and Rev A. J. Van Fleet; Boston university, Rev. H. C. McDermott and Rev. J. H. Race; Wyoming seminary, J. E. Bone J. Bradshaw, S. G. Snowden, J. C. Johnson, E. B. Olmstead, J. B. Seveel, W. A. May, C. D. Winters, J. W. Russell and V. W. Corbin.

A report was submitted by the com mittee on conference collections stating that the sum of \$554 had been received as follows: Binghamton, \$128; Chenango, \$43; Honesdale, \$77; Owego, \$98; Oneonta, \$57, and Wyoming, \$161 Ninety-seven charges had failed to pay their contributions and the presiding elders were requested to apportion the deficiency among the delinquent

When the committee on state of the church presented their report the folowing important addendum was incorporated in the recommendations and will form a portion of the minutes of

"Also, that we urge a careful scrutiny f the church records on all the charges, that the rights of the membership may be maintained, and yet our conference be spared the embarrass ment and wrong of carrying and reporting fictitious numbers. This will require courage on the part of the pastors; for it will not be a pleasing task to report less than he seemed to take. * * * In short, we wish to utter a pronounced opinion against the huge numbers in our aggregated conference nembership, who are dead; who have drifted into other communion; who hold no spiritual, social or financial relations with our church; and do not re gard themselves as amenable to our

jurisdiction." Temperance and Prohibition. At this stage the routine of the busliess was interrupted when Rev. Francis Gendall read the report of the com-mittee on temperance and prohibition. When the committee was called general silence prevailed and the large audience listened eagerly to the reading of the report, in expectation that some reference would be made to the speech of Rev. J. C. Hogan, delivered at the Prohibition rally on Friday night. No allusion was, however, made to the matter, but a strong recommendation was made that the anniversary of the Temperance association should find a regular place in the meetings of the conference. Dr. Smith asked whether it was intended that the meeting should be similar in character to that held on Friday, and was informed that the recmmendation was intended as a means to "shut out that sort of thing."

After the recommendation was adopted, Rev. E. R. D. Briggs, requested permission on a question of privilege to submit some resolutions. The request having been granted, the reverend gentleman read the following:

Whereas, The Women's Christian Temperance union of this city kindly tendered to the Prohibitionists of the Wyoming conference a reception at the First Baptist church in the evening of

Whereas, The chairman of that meeting indulged in a personal attack upon an bonored member of this body, the presiding elder of the Honesdale district, using language unbecoming to the place and the occasion; therefore Resolved, That we, as Prohibitionists, enter our protest against the use of such intemperate words or actions, here

or elsewhere, in the effort to promote the cause of temperance and Prohibi-tion, or any other cause. Besolved, That while we extened to the union, our sincere thanks for their welcome and respect and to our brother for his undispelled. for his unflinching loyalty to the cause, we disdain any and all-part in, or sanc-tion of, the utterances—calling forth

we disdain any and antepart in, or sanetion of, the utterances calling forth
these resolutions; deprecating the unfortunate occurances, considering it out
of harmony with the spirit of either
moral or religious reform, and injurious to cause sought to advance.

H. H. Wilbur. Question of Privilege.

Rev. J. C. Hogan rose to a question of privilege, and requested that he might be permitted to make a statement as an explanation of what had occurred since the last quarterly meeting, when he was interrupted by Rev. Austin Griffin, who asked whether it was in order to discuss the matter, as he understood that the conference was requested to take no action on the resolutions read, they being presented as mere ex-

pressions of opinion.

The bishop said that he was given to inderstand that the resolutions had been offered merely as an expression of opinion by the gentlemen whose signatures were attached, and would have no place in the minutes of the conference, but as the resolutions affected Mr. Hogan he thought that there could be no objection to affording him the privi-lege of an explanation. Turning to Mr. Hogan, he continued: "Brother Hogan, let it be understood that you must be exceedingly temperate in all your statements today."

Mr. Hogan then said: "On March 29, 1895, Mr. Thorpe called at my house, and after a few preliminary remarks-Bishop Andrews—No, no; look at the facts. The allegations made in the resolutions were that offensive epithets had been used and an unkind spirit

shown. You must speak of their truth or falsity. I cannot permit any dissertation as to any discussion between a presiding elder and a preacher. You must confine yourself to the question raised in the resolutions, where the offensive epithets are deprecated.

Mr. Hogan—I asked Mr. Thorpe— Bishop Andrews—That is not the point and I cannot allow you to go into

Mr. Hogan-Well, it is not a personal matter between Mr. Thorpe and myself, but one of principle. I am ready to re-call one expression where I used a characterization, but I will not take back one single word of the charges made. As to offering an apology, I refuse to do so. I have been called a crank and a fanatic and I want to know upon what authority Mr. Thorpe makes such insulting presumptions." Mr. Hogan then began to make wild charges, but the stern ruling of the bishop and the overpowering feeling of the meeting soon put a termination to the incident. The New Officers.
