THE SOUTH SIDE FIRE

Two Dwelling Houses That Were Insured Were Burned. Ascribed as the cause of the fatal fire that started the South Side at 2:30 yesterday morning, is the overturning and explosion of a lighted kerosene lamp in the basement of the dwelling house of Martin Gaughan at Irving avenue and Fifth street.

The house of John Logatka, on the right, caught fire and also burned up. All of their furniture was saved. The fire several times threatened to spread itself to the house of Edward Haggerty, but a stream of water on the side towards the flames kept it from catching.

The fire was extinguished a few minutes before 4 o'clock. Gaughan valued his property at \$1,000 and had it insured for \$800; Logatka holds \$500 insurance on his property, and valued it at \$600. The damage to Haggerty's house will not exceed \$25.
