TO RECEIVE PIFTY MILLION

In Consequence of Increased Indomnity and Russian Interference Japan Will Evacuate Chinese Territory-Trenty of Peace Ratified.

London, May 7.-The Times today says that it is reported that in consideration of Japan's abandonment of the Liao-Tung Peninsula she will receive an additional indemnity of \$50,000,000. Che Foo, May 7.-Count Ito, president of the Japanese council of minis-ters, arrived here today in order to be present at the exchange of the ratifi-cations of the treaty of peace.
