RATIFICATIONS OF PEACE

Washington, May 9 .- An official dispatch from Tokio, received at the Japanese legation this afternoon, states that the ratifications of the treaty of peace between Japan and China were exchanged at Chefoo on Wednesday. It is understood that no change was mad in the text of the treaty as originally concluded, but that taking into account the recommendations made by Russia, Germany and France, the Japanese government has agreed to renounce the permanent possession of the Liao Tung peninsula, on condition. nowever, that the arrangements regarding the form and the terms of the re nunciation shall be reserved for adjustment between itself and the government of China This latter stipulation is construed to
