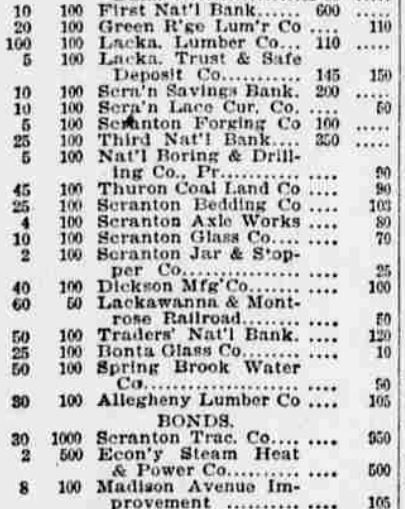
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INDUSTRIAL TOPICS.

The statement of shipments of anthracite coal for the week ended May 4 shows that the companies paid very little attention to restricting production during the week, the output amounting to 921,636 tons, or 186,314 tons more than in the corresponding period last year.

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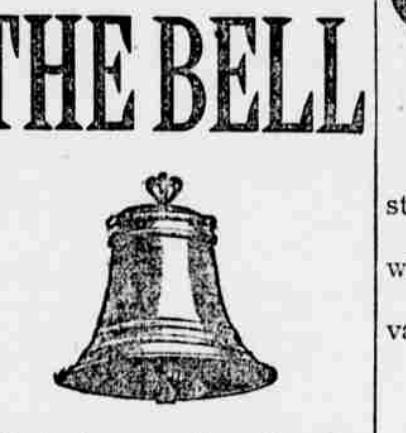
