ANOTHER KILLING.

Fatal Quarrel Between Two Farmers—The Older Kills the Younger.

A most deplorable quarrel has for some time existed between Captain James Williams and William Chapman, both of Jackson township. On Wednesday afternoon a quarrel occurred and Williams shot and almost instantly killed Chapman. Williams is a man of 53 years, and Chapman about 33. Immediately after the shooting Williams arrested himself. William Atkinson, who committed him to the custody of the township constable, and he was brought to Wilkes-Barre yesterday and confined in the county jail. Williams claims that he had a just defense, that he fired first at Chapman. The case is a most deplorable one.

A STRIKE AT A MINE.

Yesterday morning the drivers and car runners at South shaft No. 1 of the Susquehanna Coal company at Nanant, Pa., went on strike, and work was at once suspended by Superintendent Morgan. It appears that nearly a month ago three boys employed at the mine were discharged, all for apparently good reasons. On Wednesday night the strikers at the mine went to the mine foreman and demanded the reinstatement of the three discharged boys, declaring they would all refuse to go to work yesterday morning unless their demand was at once complied with. The superintendent, Superintendent Morgan, tried to reason with the boys, but they would not be reasoned with, so the superintendent ordered them away and directed the works to be closed down. Hundreds of men are now out of employment at the mine. Morgan says next Monday work will be resumed, but with a different lot of boys as drivers.

BROKE HIS WHEEL.

On Wednesday evening about 11 o'clock as a young man was riding down Franklin street on his bicycle a pretty rapid speed his wheel went into one of the numerous holes in the pavement, dislodging him to the pavement, severely injuring one of his legs, besides breaking his wheel.
