If the apostles were able to do all the work he diaconate would not have been es rablished, but inasmuch as they had no line and that it would be unwise for hem to leave the Word of God to serve tables, they advised the church to eleceven men to help them. According t the Biblical and apostolic idea, they are to serve tables, that is, they are to uperintend the temporal or monetary affairs of the church. To this purpose the office was brought into vogue.

"It is unwise on the part of the pas for to interfere with the business affairs of the church and at the sam time neglect his own specific duties and on the other hand the deacons T. 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
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
