

To be compelled to keep within a speed of eight miles an hour on a stretch of perfect as-phalt is not a little irksome to the expert wheelman, and riders are often tempted to exceed that speed and run the risk of de-tection on the strength of the difficulty the police will have in determining how fast the machine is traveling. This difficulty, however, is only fancied. It is the easiest thing in the world to swear to it without reading the cyclometer or knowing the distance ridden. All that is necessary is for the observer to note carefully the number of revolutions the pedals make in a given period of time, say five seepnds, or a single second, and then if the gear is known the speed is known




