SURFACE IS GOING DOWN. Alarming Disturbance That Has Taken Place at Prospect Park.

MANY FINE BUILDINGS RUINED. There Has Been a General Depression of the Surface in the Affected District of Eight Inches—Owners of the Damaged Properties.

For the last six months that portion of Prospect park between Summit avenue and Main avenue has been gradually settling, but the worst grading occurred yesterday morning, between 3 and 4 o'clock.

The affected area covers about an acre and a half, the center being about the middle of the vacant lot between the houses of Professor J. C. Taylor and Thomas Green, whose houses are the ones most badly damaged.
