INDICATIONS OF A CRIME.

They Were Discovered by Boys on the Ridge Near Archbald. Startling disclosures which point to an abortion committed several weeks ago on "The Ridge," near Archbald, have been made known to County Detective Leyshon. He was at work on the case until 8 o'clock last night, and it is probable that the arrest of the woman in the case and the person who brought on her illness will be accomplished.

A peculiar feature of the case is that the body of a foetus, of from 7 to 9 months' development, was found three weeks ago in the pond near Jones, Simpson & Co.'s breaken The discovery was made by some boys at play The body was found in a lard pail over the top of which was tied a cloth. To this was attached another pail containing lumps of coal, which were not heavy enough to sink the gruesome thing to the bottom.

The engineer had further information to give and it is not unlikely that the case will be brought to an issue today or tomorrow.


