CONFLAGRATION AT LYNI

Was Started by a Pirecracker in Union Street.

SAGAMORE HOTEL BURNED

Several Explosions-Two Men Meet at Awful Death-Hard Work for the Firemen-The Loss About \$150,-000. Insurance \$100,000.

Lynn, Mass., July 3 .- As the result of a firecracker among the fireworks in the hardware store of L. A. May, Nos. 283 to 289 Union street, here, this forenoon, the Sagamore Hotel block was completely gutted by fire, and adjoin-ing buildings were badly damaged by water, entailing a loss of about \$150,000. The fire started at 11.15 and burned so rapidly that second and third alarms were immediately run in, as the block is situated in the heart of the retail business section of the city.

It spread to N. Jenkins' confectionery store and W. C. Gilman's liquor store from the hardware establishment and then burned up through the hotel to the roof of the building. The flames also threatened to enguif the building occupied by Goldsmith & Moore, carpet and furniture dealers, at Nos. 273 to 275 Union street, and other adjoining buildings, and they were drenched with water. During the fire several explosions in the hardware store deterred the firemen somewhat in their work, but no on was injured, and the flames were finally controlled soon after noon. Fire spread through the hotel so rapidly that the occupants of the house were given a short time to get out, and several narrowly escaped death.

Aged Guest Rescued. Fireman David Upton rescued Sydney Greenwood, an aged guest, from the The Cream of an Immense Sagamore hotel, and a domestic, whose name could not be ascertained, was the hotel and carried out just before the roof fell in, a few moments before noon. On the way to the fire the police ambulance collided with steamer No. 2 and was wrecked. The engine was not injured and no one was hurt.

The Sagamore hotel was only recently remodeled and occupied the three upper stories of the block while the ground floor was devoted to stores. The insurance is about \$100,000.

Among the losers in the Sagamore building are: L. A. May, house furnishings, loss \$50,000, insurance, \$25,000; S. .N Jenkins, confectioner, loss \$3,500, insurance \$1,500; W. C. Gilman, liquors, loss \$5,000, Insurance \$10,000; Thomas Dogue, proprietor of the Sagamore hotel, loss to contents, \$20,000, insurance \$1,000; W. Brown, barber, loss \$2,500. partly insured. The damage to the building is estimated at almost \$65,000 Goldsmith & Moore's loss is about \$7, 500, partly insured.

Two Men Are Killed.

The employes of the May company Harry F. Hicks, 63 and 57 years old respectively, who were working on the third floor back when the explosion occurred and did not have time to escape. The body of Hicks was found in the ruins this afternoon, burned to a crisp, his identification being made possible only by a fragment of a neck scarf. The three men were executed at once on a platform built with a drow in stead of a weight. The trap was sprung at 11.45 and in ten minutes they were all dead and cut down.

Philadelphia, July 3.-A lighted cigar carelessly thrown among fireworks caused more noise, smoke and excitement at Juniper and Market streets this afternoon than all the expected pyrotechnics of tomorrow will evoke. James Dickson occupies the ground stove and range sales room. In an unfortunate moment Mr. Dickson rented ese-American Fireworks company. The fireworks merchants filled the front of the store with a large and well assorted stock of crackers, pin wheels, skyrockets and all the other noise production necessities to a proper observance of the "Fourth." They exposed for sale on a stand on the sidewalk a collection of fireworks similar to the stock in the store, John Limperakis, an Italian, divided part of the pavement with them

About 4 o'clock two men purchased some fireworks in the store, and in passing out one of them threw away the stump of a lighted eigar. Almost instantly a preliminary "bang" followed, and then the fusiliade began. Passers-by were scattered right and left by exploding bombs, devil chasers, balls from roman candles and rocket sticks. The cannonading speedily attracted thousands. Panic stricken women poured from dry goods and
