SONS OF ST. GEORGE.

Second Day of the Convention in Royal Arcanum Hall.

The session of the second day of the Sons of St. George state convention opened in the Royal Arcanum hall yesterday morning with Grand President House in the chair. Business was transacted by the convention, and President House appointed William Pooler, of St. Clair, grand chaplain, and James Stevens, of Washington, D. C., assistant messenger. In making the latter selection, President House incidentally referred to the growth of the order in the past, and expressed it as his opinion that the interests of the order in that section demanded a representation. The convention heartily approved the president's choice and complimented him for his foresight.

The morning session was devoted principally to the reports of committee and action thereon. The treasurer's report was comprehensive in detail, and showed the financial condition of the order to be entirely satisfactory.

The work of the convention this afternoon was devoted to revising the rules and the adoption of amendments. In this respect, the convention, it is understood, is making some radical changes, but the delegates feel certain that whatever is done will be of benefit to the order in general.

Last evening the delegates to the convention went to Pittston where a banquet was tendered to them by Key-stone Lodge No. 4. The convention will probably finish its business and adjourn tomorrow.

BIG ASSUMPSIT SUIT.

After Goods in Hands of Wilkes-Barre and Wyoming Traction Company.

Attorney Rust presented, for his client, Joseph Hoeler, had filed an exemplified record of a suit in assumpsit from Cumberland county with Prothonotary Lewellyn, of this county; with judgment, etc., in the suit of Joseph Hoeler, payee, vs. J. B. Hursh, defendant, and the Wilkes-Barre and Wyoming Valley Traction Company and John Graham, individually, as defendants. The firm of Hursh & Graham, exarshers.

The suit was brought on promissory notes and judgment obtained on a debt of \$8,896.50 with interest from Nov. 21, 1892. Sheriff Walters was instructed to issue an attachment execution against said J. B. Hursh, the defendant, and to attach all the goods, chattels, etc., in whatsoever hands the same may be, and especially in the hands of the Wilkes-Barre and Wyoming Valley Traction Company and John Graham, individually, as a member of the firm of Hursh & Graham, and summon them as garnishees. Sheriff Walters yesterday morning served the writ, which was made returnable in September.

Railway Men's Meeting.

The Pennsylvania State Railway association will assemble in the city of Wilkes-Barre in annual session on the 4th and 5th of Sept. The meetings will be held in the Ninth regiment armory, which has been engaged for the occasion and there will be from 100 to 250 present. General Manager John Graham has the local arrangement in charge and nothing will be left undone to make it pleasant for the visitors. An elaborate spread will be provided, and a general entertainment and justification given at Hanover Park during their stay. One thing handicaps Mr. Graham in this, as it does Wilkes-Barre on many occasions, that is the lack of hotel accommodations, but he has been equal to the emergency, however, and has arranged for the accommodation of the visitors by the use of cots, etc.

Struck by Lightning.

Miss Bessie Williams, daughter of William Williams, of Edwardsville, was

struck by lightning at 5 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Miss Williams is in the employ of Motorman Louis Reese, of Kingston, and was walking in the yard at the time she was struck. Mr. Reese carried her into the house, and it was about 8 o'clock when they brought her to consciousness. The shock took effect in the head and neck. She was reported as being much better yesterday, though her escape from death was very narrow.

PRISON COMMISSION MEETING.

Business Transacted at the Regular Meeting Yesterday.

The prison commissioners held their regular monthly meeting yesterday morning with President Coniff in the chair. The following bills were ordered paid: E. B. Yordy, \$15; Miller & Co., \$10; P. McGroarty, \$30.20; Vulcan Iron works, \$4.35; Kirkendall & Son, \$2.92; Yokes & Sons, \$10.00; \$18.40; Photos, Straw & Co., \$8.63; Williamson & Wallace, \$10.63; Dodge & Speece, \$21.70; Ice Manufacturing company, \$12.51; Isaac Long, dry goods, \$15.55.

In prison were found 146 persons. Of these 88 were serving sentence, 57 awaiting trial and one awaiting execution.

Prisoners—George Mahle, John Kuzmann, Joseph Miller and David Holler—applied for recommendation to governor for good behavior, which papers were granted. The jail is now crowded to its utmost capacity, and in five of the cells four prisoners each are confined. If this state of affairs keep up, the commissioners will be compelled to build an addition to the jail, for the overcrowding during the hot weather is a very bad thing for the prisoners.

QUARREL OVER A CORPSE.

Mrs. William Cool Unable to Get Possession of Her Husband's Remains.

Some weeks ago William Cool, of Stanton alley, fell from a tree and broke his neck. After being treated in his father's home on Stanton street, he was removed to the hospital, where, on Tuesday morning, he died, and that night his remains were taken to his father's residence by his brother James, and preparations were made to hold the funeral there that place.

Yesterday afternoon the wife of the dead man called upon Mayor Nichols and asked if there were no means by which she could get possession of her husband's remains, as her father-in-law refused to have them taken from his house. When closely questioned as to because she was a Catholic and her husband a Protestant and that his family were afraid that she would have the remains buried in a Catholic cemetery with Catholic services. She said she had no such intention and if given possession of the remains would see that they were buried in a Protestant cemetery with all the services of that faith. The mayor will try to restore peace among the members of the family.

CAUSES A SENSATION. Rev. J. A. Zahn, the Scientist of Notre Dame, at Plattsburg, N. Y.

Plattsburg, N. Y., Aug. 7.—Quite the sensation of last week at the Roman Catholic summer school have been the lectures of Rev. J. A. Zahn, Ph. D., C. S. C., the eminent scientist of Notre Dame university. Dr. Zahn came hither out of the west with a reputation already established for extreme liberalism. To that reputation he has added so much by his lectures here that already the more conservative Roman Catholics in the school are breathing hints of "heresy." Indeed, there are not a few who will be rather disappointed than otherwise if Dr. Zahn's alleged unorthodoxy shall not form the basis of a church trial.

The theories Dr. Zahn has inculcated in his lectures here command attention merely as coming from an eminent Roman Catholic, who enjoys in an especial degree the favor of the holy see. He simply accepts the conclusions of science and insists that there is nothing in them at variance with a legitimate interpretation of the Divine record.
