

HABEAS CORPUS HEARINGS.

Charles Travers Could Not Raise \$2,000 Bail and Went Back to Jail Again.

Other Hearings. Charles Travers was brought down from jail yesterday morning and taken before Judge' Bennett on a writ of habeas corpus. A number of witnesses were heard, among them John Rainow, who testified before the court that Travers told him he was going to give Orr a roast; D. H. Cruser, A. H. 
