The weather was propitious, though hot, and fully 10,000 Republicans from other Ohio counties came in during the forenoon. The early morning demonstrations of today were on the arrival of ex-Governor Foraker, from Cincinnati, and Senator Sherman, who came over from Columbus on the special train with Governor McKinley.
