Early in July forty-two members of the colony, convinced of the peril of their position, broke away from the colony and fled to the north. It was re-ported to the state department that thirty-two had been killed, but this was never confirmed. They were absolutely without food or clothing and for weeks were compelled to eat the beans of the mes-quite bushes and drink the brackish branch water. 




