ACCIDENT AT THE EMPIRE.

A Carriage Containing Ten Men Drops to the Bottom.

Yesterday morning an accident happened at the Empire breaker of the Lehigh and Wilkes-Barre Coal company, which did not prove fatal to any of the men. The carriage, which was being dropped down the shaft by Engineer Halliday, so fast that at the bottom they were shot in every direction.

The other car was almost almost overturned before the engineer recovered control of the engines. The ominous sound of crushing timber, a cloud of dust on the outside, and the hammer of the beams at the bottom of the shaft struggling to escape a worse calamity told that something had happened.

On the carriage were, at about 6.45, David Williams, Richard Roderick, Robert Davis, Michael Muscavero, William Casper and five other Hungarians or Poles, whose names could not be learned. Richard Roderick was injured quite seriously about the body. Davis was also badly hurt. The others fortunately escaped with slight bruises. Some of the men walked home, the company's ambulance carrying the others.

Engineer Halliday had a similar accident at the South Wilkes shaft some months ago. When Engineer Kemp died Halliday was promoted to his position, and this is the first accident he has had since coming to the Empire. Mr. Roderick, who was injured, is a well-known contractor, and has done many important pieces of work. The mine was idle yesterday, but will resume work today.

The state cannot safely do more, and careful thought on the subject will convince any intelligent person, who is not looking for a political gain, that the interests of the taxpayer would be best served as faithfully as the interests of the pauper. The unjust criticism which sometimes follows the action of the poor, who are limited in their use of the money entrusted to their care, might be spared, if the point was not understood. The almshouse is provided for the abjectly destitute, not otherwise provided for, and the law does not contemplate doing more than to offer a guarantee against suffering and hunger. Fortunately the law is not observed, and in most places, the county homes are comfortable for the inmates. The law is not intended to effect a cure, as the race deterioration will be perpetuated. Alms-giving that does not reach the root of the evil, is most pernicious in its results. Even the church, that has seemed to be the divinely commissioned agency for moving the hearts of men to acts of charity, has been greatly criticised as an alms-giver.
