STOCKS AND BONDS.

New York, Oct. 28.—Duing the early part of the session at the Stock Exchange Equidations were the order of the day and certain of the Industrials scored material losses. Sugar was noticeably heavy in this group, while the Grangers, and Manhattan were the weakest among the railways. At home the continued drought in the winter wheat belt causes uneasiness and some selling of the western shares. The hears were quite aggressive, especially in the Industrials, Sugar coming in for the most attention. Sugar dropped from 103% to 101% and latter railled to 102%. A good deal of long stock came out. The railway list ran off ¼a1½ per cent. Manhattan leading. In the afterneon when it became known that no armoon when it became known that no ar-rangements had been made looking to gold exports and the St. Paul stategold exports and the St. Paul statement for September was given out, Hquidastions ccused and the market gradually assumed a firmer tone. The St. Paul report for September makes an excellent showing, not carning having increased about \$340,000. The afternoon recovery ranged from 14 to 24 per cent, and nearly every stock on the feet participated in the upward movement. Tenuessee Coal and Iron fell 114 to 37% on the announcement that the deal with the Sioes company had been declared off. Subsequently the stock recovered to 2814. The market closed firm with some stocks showing guins of 4a14 per cent, on the day. The total sales were 207,840 shares.

Business of all kinds is better and the whier gives promise of a still greater increase on activity in all directions. The renewal of prospectry was striking, especially in the west, where the farmers have had an unusually large corn crop. Our road has been greesly improved in every respect since the last annual inspection, but still there is always operatingly for improvement. portunity for improvement. On the eastern system the principal work con-templated is a continuation of the revision and straightening of the I. We propose to take out more of ourves, and in fact all that we pres can. In the west we will lengther our double track and add to the equipment in various ways. We have ordered 6,000 freight cars, which will be built and delivered during the year. At Fittsburg we contemplate the builting of a new freight station, and at Com-bus, O., a similar structure will shortly be erected. The bridge over the Colo-river from Newport to Cincircati will be completed during the winter.


