Boston retail anthracite coal prices have been advanced 25 cents a ton by all dealers, making 50 cents since lowest prices of the summer on furnace coal and 75 cents on all other grades. Prices per ton now are: Furnace, \$5.25; egg. \$5.50; stove, \$5.75; chestnut, \$5.75; Shamokin, \$6; Franklin, \$7. The market there is reported to be very active, and another advance in prices will probably be made soon.

The statement of business of the Central Railroad of New Jersey for September shows: Gross earnings, \$1,181,-218; increase, \$154,211; expenses, \$159,-640; increase, \$155,543; net earnings, \$489,757; increase, \$116,658. 

The first star-spangled banner, Mr. Houstman shows, consisted of thirteen stripes and thirteen stara, the latter ranged in a circle. That was adopted by congress in 1777, from a model made by Mrz. John Ross, of Philadelphia, who was appointed to the poat of flagmaker to the government. But the admission of Vermont and Kentucky to the Union led to a change completing of Blue Points on half shell in carriers.

The rapid admission of states, how-ever, necessitated a change in the pro-posed plan of adding a star and aripe for each new possession, and in 1818, when twenty states composed the Union, it was agreed to reduce the number of stripes to thirteen, in honor of the original federation, and to ar-range the twenty stars in the shape of a great star.
