REPUBLICANS TRIUMPHANT

Elect Their Candidates in All of the Uncertain States.

THE "OFF YEAR" WAS LIVELY

Ohio and Massachusetts Elect Republican Governors by Large Majorities--Returns from Other Localities Also Show Big Gains.

Special to the Scranton Tribune. New York, Nov. 5.--The latest returns from the various States throughout the country show that the Republicans have held their own in nearly every locality of importance, except New York city, where Tammany is again in control.

Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois and Utah give majorities for the Republican candidates while Mississippi and Virginia vote Democratic again.

The bulletins received early this morning indicate that Republicans have made large gains in the Democratic strongholds everywhere, and give evidence that the faith of the nation in the party of protection and prosperity has not been shaken.

IOWA.

Des Moines, Nov. 5.--Iowa elected its full list of state officers and the legislature, which will choose a United States Senator to succeed William B. Allison, Republican, on March 3, 1897.

ILLINOIS.

Springfield, Nov. 5.--A special election for representative in congress was held today in the Eighteenth district of Illinois to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Frederick Remann, Republican, who was chosen last November, receiving 16,520 votes to Democrat, 12,029 for Brooks, Populist, and 778 for Kopley, Prohibitionist.

KANSAS.

Topeka, Nov. 4.--Kansas today elected a Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the state, to succeed David Martin, Republican, who was nominated by his party for re-election, and was generally supported on a non-partisan basis.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston, Nov. 5.--Massachusetts today elected its full list of state officers and legislature, and representative in congress from the Sixth district to fill the vacancy caused by the death of William Brewster, Republican, who was elected in November last, receiving 16,205 votes to 5,777 for Little, Democrat, and 1,778 for Harris, Prohibitionist.

MISSISSIPPI.

Jackson, Nov. 5.--Mississippi today elected its full list of state officers, and the legislature, which will choose a United States Senator to succeed Calvin H. Wiley, Democrat, whose term will expire March 3, 1897.

NEBRASKA.

Omaha, Nov. 5.--Nebraska today elected a Justice of the Supreme Court and two Representatives of the State University, the candidates being as follows: Democrats, Judge, T. J. Mahoney; Regents, John H. Ames, W. H. Jones; Secretary of State, J. L. Power; Auditor, W. D. Holder; Treasurer, A. Q. May; Attorney General, Wiley N. Morrill; Superintendent of Education, A. Kinnannon; Clerk of Supreme Court, E. W. Brown; Land Commissioner, John M. Simpson; Revenue Agent, Wirt Adams; People's Party Governor, Frank Burkitt; Lieutenant Governor, B. W. TAMMANY AGAIN IN POWER

New York City Gives the Tiger 20,000. The State Republican Plurality Estimated at 80,000--Exciting Contest in Maryland.

Early last evening it became apparent that New York, New Jersey, Maryland and Kentucky, the states that had been considered uncertain, had gone Republican by large majorities.

VIRGINIA.

Richmond, Nov. 5.--Virginia today elected one-half of the members of the state senate, and all the members of the House of Delegates.

NEW YORK.

Tammany Again in Control of New York City--The State Republican.

Albany, Nov. 5.--New York today elected state officers, except Governor and Lieutenant Governor, both branches of the legislature, six Justices of the Supreme Court, and a Representative in congress from the ninth district to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Andrew J. Campbell, Republican, who was elected in November last, receiving 13,450 votes to 10,000 majority.

NEW JERSEY.

Griggs Elected Governor by a Plurality of 15,000--Large Republican Gain.

Trenton, Nov. 5.--New Jersey today elected a governor, seven state senators, and the lower house of the state legislature. The candidates for governor were: Democrat, Henry H. Griggs; Republican, John W. Griggs; People's Party, William B. Ellis; Prohibitionist, Henry W. Wilbur, Socialist, John Joseph B. Kelm.

Baltimore, Nov. 5.--Maryland today elected its full list of state officers, and the legislature, which will choose a United States Senator to succeed Charles H. Gibson, Republican, on March 3, 1897.

NO USE FOR THE DEMOCRACY

The State Ticket is Successful for 100,000 to 175,000 Plurality--Judge Smith Runs Ahead of His Ticket--Result in Detail.

Philadelphia, Nov. 5.--Returns received up to midnight from most of the counties and from three-fourths of the wards of Philadelphia show that Haywood, Republican, for state treasurer, will have a majority in the state exceeding 160,000, the majority may reach 175,000.
