REPUBLICAN

Clean Sweep in City and County.

DEMOCRATS ARE ROUTED

Willard and Smith Lead Their Respective Tickets.

BARTL'S VICTORY ASSURED

Haywood's Plurality at Least 2,500.

Willard and Smith Each 2,000 Ahead of Treasurer Candidates. Judge Rice Will Get 1,200 Complimentary Votes. Longstreet's Big Success.

Lackawanna county and Scranton city contribute their share to the general cause for Republican re-jecting. The whole Republican ticket, state and county, was given a handsome vote, some of the majorities being remarkable considering the fact that the voting was very light even for an off year.

At midnight the returns from 105 districts gave Haywood a majority of 2,342, and indicated Judge Willard to be 2,000 votes ahead of his ticket, Judge Rice 1,200 and P. P. Smith 2,000. Mr. Bartl was less than 100 votes behind his ticket, but had 890 majority; Dr. Longstreet was 400 votes ahead of his ticket.

With the 105 districts heard from and careful estimates by experts of the sixty-nine unheard from districts Haywood carried the county by 2,500 majority. Willard ran 2,000 ahead of his ticket. Rice received a neighborhood compliment of 1,200 votes and Smith was given about 2,000 more than the head of his ticket. Dr. Longstreet is elected by 2,000 majority and Engineer Bartl has a safe majority of from 900 to 1,000.

Only Grain of Consolation.

The only grain of consolation that the Democrats can get out of the day's results is that Judge Smith is probably elected to the minority seat on the Superior bench. The very limited returns from over the state would indicate that the fight for the seventh place was between Smith and Yerkes, with the chances in favor of Smith.

The county polled only about 15,000 votes, and the city, which can easily muster 12,000 votes, recorded only about 7,000. Of this amount Haywood received about 4,500 and Myers 2,500, all of which makes a very cheerful outlook for the spring elections. Carbondale was carried by both Longstreet and Bartl, and Dunmore went Republican for the head of the ticket and judges. For the first time in its history Olyphant went Republican by 40 votes, Haywood receiving 184 and Myers 144. The work of Hon. Charles P. O'Malley's friends in this town was apparent by the 228 votes which were cast for Judge Willard there.

One instance of the small vote cast is given in the Third district of the Nineteenth ward, where only 97 of the 400 voters exercised their right of suffrage.

In the city Willard received 5,622 of the 7,000 votes cast, and Smith got 3,393.

In the Republican Club Rooms.

The rooms of the Central Republican club in the Price building were filled with bustle, activity, felicitation and shouts until several hours after most of the city was still in slumber. It was a happy gathering, especially after 10:20 o'clock, when began to be received returns from country districts, indicating that the Republican ticket was safe in this county, from top to bottom.

There were several special causes for gratification. Edmund Bartl, the candidate for county surveyor, sat at a table with two clerks and kept tabs on the returns and their figures at 11:30 o'clock showed that Mr. Bartl would be elected, by from 800 to 1,200 majority, notwithstanding the cutting he had received in certain districts on account of the Dr. A. P. bugaboo.

Dr. Samuel P. Longstreet, after devoting the evening up to 11 o'clock to professional business, made his appearance and was greeted by a round of lusty applause.

There were present during the most of the night until 1 o'clock Colonel E. H. Rippe, Major Everett Warren, Attorney M. W. Lowry, Senator J. C. Vaughan, William Connell, City Solicitor Torrey, Alderman W. R. Miller, Attorney Fred W. Fleitz, County Commissioner Roberts, County Detective Leyshon, James O. Dismick, Select Councilman Chittenden, Dr. Stein, P. L. Wormser, John Gibbons, Sheriff Clemons, Representative C. P. O'Malley.

At Democratic Headquarters.

The scene at Democratic headquarters was equally do exciting sympathy. At no time during the night was there more than a baker's dozen around the single table, with a couple of dozen chairs, completed the entire furnishing and fixturing of the room. Committeeman Martin P. Flynn presided over the single table sheet that was visible. They had made no arrangements for the night, and the consequence their returns were very meagre.

Secretary John J. Gaffney was the only man who seemed to take any amount of interest in the result. Early in the night he hid himself to the central police station, and as the ballot boxes were brought in by the election clerks he sat down at the figures and made his computations alone and unaided. The only returns received at headquarters were those brought in by the faithful on the election boards.

About 1 o'clock the headquarters were deserted save by ex-Sheriff Fahey, J. J. O'Boyle, M. Flynn, Dr. J. J. Donavan, Martin P. Flynn, Attorney J. J. McAndrew, Councilman Morgan Sweeney, School Controller James O'Boyle and Editor R. J. Beattie.

The Republican clean sweep was becoming painfully apparent about this time. Interest in the county election was suddenly lost, and the clerks turned to a more pleasant topic, the Tammany victory in New York. At 11 o'clock everybody was sitting back in tilted chairs talking about the great features of the day, the light vote all around and John C. Moran's rashness in voting the straight Republican ticket in the Twelfth ward shortly before midnight ex-Sheriff Fahey said:

"It is quite apparent that we are beaten, and I am not surprised. What does not surprise me is that we have so many votes as we did without having a nickle to run the campaign. We were handicapped and that's all there was to it."

During the entire evening not a single Democratic candidate put in an appearance at the headquarters, and no one thereabouts seemed to know where they were, and the only one who was in Carbondale all day, and did not come down during the night, Bartl's majority in the Pioneer City being a message which carried him to the Democrat would excuse himself from conveying.
