Haywood's Piurality at Least 2,500. Willard and Smith Each 2,000 Ahead of Treasurer Candidates. Judge Rice Will Get 1,200 Complimentary Votes. Longstreet's Big

Lackawanna county and Scranton ity contribute their share to the general cause for Republican rejoicing. The whole Republican ticket, state and county, was given a handsome vote, some of the majorities being remarkable considering the fact that the voting was very light even for an off year. At midnight the returns from 105 dis-

tricts gave Haywood a majority of 2342, and indicated Judge Willard to be 1340 votes ahead of his ticket, Judge Rice 1200 and P. P. Smith 2099. Mr. Bartl was less than 100 votes behind his ticket, but had 890 majority; Dr. Longstreet was 400 votes ahead of his ticket. With the 105 districts heard from and
