H. E. Paine Eulogizes His Old Commander Before the Heptasophs

At the conclusion of their meeting in Raub's hall, Wyoming avenue, last evening, the Heptasophs were enter-tained by H. E. Paine with an informal talk on General George Thomas, under

Mr. Paine gave a brief sketch of the famous, loyal Virginian unionists's life, told of his advancement and achieve-ments without the ald or influence of civic friends in Washington, such as other generals had, and told in a de-tailed and interesting manner of his strategic retreat from Atlanta and its culmination, the glorious victory over Hood, which Mr. Paine asserted was the last great hattle of the war. Mr. Paine did not hesitate to characterize General Thomas as one of the greatest generals the world has ever known.
