One of the victims was a young woman, and the other a man. They had been taken out and beaten to death with new buggy traces.

SAID PASHA NERVOUS.

He Is of the Impression that His Health Would Rest More Securely on His Shoulders at the British Embassy. Constantinople, Dec. 6.—The fact that Said Pasha has sought refuge in the British embassy has caused a great sensation in all circles, and is a general topic of conversation. It is impossible to foresee the outcome, but the fact of a native statesman of the highest rank seeking an asylum in a foreign embassy is recognized everywhere as indicating an extremely critical situation, which it is believed, may become a turning point in Turkey's history.
