Senator Allen Declares That the Populists Are Patriotic.

A PLEA FOR CUBAN PATRIOTS

The Nebraska Senator Scoffs at American Citizens Who Yearn for Titles. Proposes to Honor Distinguished Men—Other Washington Topics.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 11.—The senate was in session today only an hour and a quarter, and it then adjourned until to-morrow. Three propositions were introduced in honor of distinguished men of the past. The first was for the purchase of a \$500 monument to the French novelist, Victor Hugo, to be placed in the new library building in Washington, now almost finished.

IN CASE OF IMPEACHMENT.
