JIM BURWICK'S MANNERISMS

Explains Why He So Easily Influences His Audiences of Railroaders-Brief Mention of the Doings of Ministers and Their People,

"Jim" Burwick, the freight conductor-preacher is adderssing large crowds nightly at the railroad branch of the Young Men's Christian association. He is a character whose methods might be watched with profit by anyone interested in the art of "getting at" an audience. Burwick is not a horrible example, but up to six years ago he was just as vicious and just as rough as might be expected of any real bad railroader.

Then he was converted, and for th last few years had been doing a power of good among men of his own vocation when the international committee of the Young Men's Christian association drafted him as a speaker. "Jim" Burwick is not an orator, exhorter, evangelist or preacher; he dislikes being called any of these and says he "just talks to the boys." That's one secret of his success; he's thoroughly in touch and sympathy .with his hearers, unconsciously uses the vernacular of the railroad, gets down to their level and uses his knowledge of the Bible and free quotations from it with startling success.

He's a contradiction of the supposition that an uneducated pleader is obliged to resort to wit and story in order to wield his auditory. Burwick does not attempt any wit or story except in such form as is perfectly natural to a railroader. A great deal of what he says is in the vernacular and would be almost Greek to any but a gathering of men who "pull 'er wide open" or "twist a wheel."
