Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Pas songers llave a Narrow Escape.

New York, Dec. 27 .- A serious accident was narrowly averted on the Dela-ware. Lackawanna and Western rail-road, between Little Fails and Paterson, N. J., early this morning. A loco-motive drawing eight cars while dying along at the rate of thirty-five or forty miles an hour jumped the track at the curve leading over High Bridge, across the Passaic river and fan along the ties a distance of 700 yards. The train was crowded at the time and the passengers were badly shaken up, but no one




