REPORT OF RESIDENT PHYSICIAN

Resident Physician.

The most notable event of the year for the Scranton Poor district, possibly the most important in the history of the district, was the passage by the legislature of an act providing for the care of indigent insane in poor districts under the provision of which this district is entitled to an allowance from the commonwealth of the cost of maintaining indigent insane at the Hillside Home in excess of \$1.75 per week for each insane person, the cost to the state not to exceed \$2.00 per week for each insane person. A separate account showing the exact cost of the maintenance of indigent insane was necessary under the provisions of the act and the account for the quarter ending November 30, 1855, showing an indebtedness of the commonwealth to the poor district of \$3,442.66, has been duly approved by Dr. Cadwalader Biddle, secretary of the committee on lunacy of the State Board of Public Charittes, in accordance with the provisions of the act on June 25, and the total amount due from the time of the approval of the act on June 25, and the total amount due from the state in 1895 and included in the foregoing account, but for the absence from his office of Auditor General Mylin, whose approval is necessary before a warrant on the state treasury can be drawn.

The average number of inmates at Hillside Home during the year was 306,39-365,
and the per capita cost of maintaining
paupers and insane persons at the Home,
including food, clothing, light, heat,
medicine, salaries of superintendent, resident physician, attendants, etc., exclusive
of farm products, was \$1,32 per week.
The total of the board of inmates, sane
and insane, is equal to the board of one
person for 111,729 days. Hesides this, there
were taken at the superintendent's and
employes' table during the year a number
of meals equal to the board of one person
for 10,515 days, and workmen employed
on improvements and repairs, meals equal
to the board of one person

REPORT OF RESIDENT PHYSICIAN.

January 1, 1895, there was in the asylum 141 patients, during the year 57 were admitted; 29 were discharged and 17 died, leaving December 31, 1895, 152. Of this number 74 are males and 78 females. Of the males 20 are married; 47 single; 4 widowed and 3 unknown. Of the females 24 are married; 34 single and 29 widowed.

The admission during the year were: Males, 35; females, 22-57.

Of the discharges 33 were males and 13 females-46.

The deaths were caused by: Congestion of brain, 1; hemmorrhage of bowels, 1; paresis, 7; terminal dementia, 1; paralysis, 1; valvular disease of heart, 1; uicer of stomach, 1; old age, 2; heart failure, 1; cerebrites, 1.

Of the 152 at present in the asylum 4 were admitted previous to 1835; 24 befors 1830, and 90 in the past five years.

The average daily population was 137.

During the year there were 4,437 prescriptions issued to 592 sane and 695 insane patients-1,527.
