ton, president of the American Red Cross society, sailed this morning on the steamship New York for Security of the Security Security of the S ton, en route to Constantinople, where she will seek permission to enter Armenia to administer relief to the suffering and needy of that afflicted country, Accompanying Miss Barton are Miss Lucy Graves, stenographer; Ernest Mason, linguist; George H. Pullman, private secretary to Miss Barton. and Dr. J. B. Hubbell, general field agent for the society in America, A large number of people interested in the society's relief work and friends of Miss Barton's and the others, were on hand to see the party off. When the steamer New York drew out of her dock, the large crowd present loudly cheered Miss Barton, who stood on the steamer's deck and smilingly acknowledged the compliment. From the masthead of the steamer floated the emblem of the Red Cross society. The party will do directly to South-

ampton, thence to London, Paris, Geneva, Baden Baden, Vienna and Constantinople, the trip occupying in all about three weeks. In England, France and Germany, Miss Barton will confer with the heads of all the Red Cross societies there as well as with the members of the international branch in Geneva, with a viey of securing intelligent co-operation. the situation justify it, she will establish Red Cross hospitals at Alexandretta, on the Mediterranean, and at Trebizond and Sassoun, on the Black
