

Owing to the enormous crop an general improvement in business state of Minnesota will receive this about \$100,000 more in taxes on the s of the railroads than ceived last year.

Party rates are again given on all the roads in the Joint Traffic association. The Chesapeake and Ohio announced that it would allow a party rate of 2 cents per mile, following the Ealtimore and Ohio, and now all the roads in the compact are doing the same thing. Until last Satur-day the other lines quoted only full tariff rates, which is practically acknowledg-ment that the Baltimore and Ohio South-western, in quoting for parties of ten or more a rate of 2 cents per mile, based on the short mileage, did right.
