MINER'S BENEFITS.

Annual Report of the Delaware and Hud son Employes' Relief Fund.

The annual report and statement of account of the Delaware and Hudson Miners' Relief Fund for the year 1895 has been issued to its members. This is an insurance scheme originated by this corporation several years ago, whereby the company contributed an

this corporation several years ago, whereby the company contributed an amount equal to that contributed by the employes, and in case of injury to the latter, benefits are paid, and in case of death, funeral expenses and a bonus to the family. During the year 1855 the total sum of \$238.84 was contributed by the em-ployees and \$8.855.55 was contributed by the company, a total of \$18,434.37. The amount of relief paid out was \$19.300.84. A balance in the fund Dec, 31 of \$6. \$62.91, and the amount contributed by the company \$6.185.50, left a balance Jan. 1956, of \$15, 148.41. The report shows that during the year eighty-one of the employees of the Delaware and Hudson at the Coalbrook mines re-ceived benefits, ranging from tifty cents to \$77. From No, 1 shaft thirty-one employees received from \$2 to \$55. From No, 3 shaft twelve persons received from \$2 to \$47. From Powderly mines forty-rive persons received from 50 cents to \$13.3


