

DR. LANAHAN'S VINDICATION. lle Explains Ills Course in a New Book

Called Era of Frands Baltimere, Md., April 7.—Rev. John Lanahan's book, "The Era of Frauds in the Methedist Book Concern in New York," is out today. In the preface Dr. Lanahan says no spirit of vindictive-

nces animates its publication.

The matters with which Dr. Lanahan's book deals relates to how, soon after his appointment to office as as-sistant agent in New York with the late Dr. Thomas Carleton, he found evidences of mismanagement and fraud in almost all departments of that severa rigantic oil companies, officered by heads and employes of the concern, with presumably church money for capital, were in full blast; how his efforts to stop all this resulted in a ring being formed by the accused, which, from defense, "quickly turned to offense," and Dr. Lanahan found himself nearly engulted by the waves of trouble which began to break over him.

Dr. Lanahan hopes that his book will be the means to the end he has been waiting for these many years—com-plete vindication of his course as as-sistant agent of the Methodist Book Concern during the years 1838-1872.
