**O'MALLEY WAS NON-SUITED**

**Plaintiff Was Guilty of Contributory Negligence.**  
**A VERDICT FOR ENOS FLYNN**  
**Jury Awards Him \$25 Against Mrs. Annie Barrett for Slender-Suit of Attorney Hawley for Professional Services.**  
 Dr. William Haggerty Sued.

After the evidence of the plaintiff closed yesterday morning in the \$20,000 trespass suit of Thomas J. O'Malley against the Scranton Traction company for injuries received on June 27, 1914, by being run down on North Washington avenue by a street car, an application for a nonsuit was made by Attorney Horace E. Hand, representing the defendant, on the ground that the plaintiff was guilty of contributory negligence. Judge Archbald granted the nonsuit, and in doing so expressed sympathy for Mr. O'Malley for the severe injuries he met with; but the judge ruled that under the law and the evidence the plaintiff was not entitled to recover.

In the slander suit brought by Merchant Enos Flynn, of Providence, against Mrs. Annie Barrett, a verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$25 was returned by the jury yesterday morning. The amount of damages asked was \$1,000, but Mr. Flynn would have been satisfied with the sum simply wanted to convict the defendant of uttering false stories about him in public to the detriment of his business.

In the main court room before Judge Edwards the first grand jury was that of Attorney Charles L. Hawley against John J. Howley, the Penn avenue hardware merchant. Attorney S. B. Price represented the plaintiff and Hon. Leonard Amerman and attorney M. J. Martin appeared for the defendant. The cause of the suit was Mr. Hawley's claim for \$25 for professional services rendered by the first grand jury of the dissolution of partnership of the firm of Howley Brothers. The defendant swore that all the plaintiff did was to prepare and read a list of names to be placed on the list, and that he was not involved in the dissolution of the firm. Mr. Hawley received \$100 for his services and the defendant thought that this was compensation enough. The jury rendered a verdict in favor of the plaintiff in the sum of \$200 was rendered by the jury.

The next case before Judge Edwards was that of the Green Ridge Lumber company against Patrick Ruane and Ann Ruane, his wife. Attorney J. W. Carpenter represented the plaintiff and Attorney Joseph O'Driscoll and M. E. McDonald appeared for the defendant. The plaintiff built a house for the Ruanes two years ago for \$584. It was an ordinary frame building two stories high, 30 by 28 feet, and not plastered, but painted with one coat. The defendants refused to pay more than \$300 on the ground that the house was not built according to agreement. The plaintiff's claim with interest now amounts to about \$625. The jury retired to deliberate at adjournment.

**DR. HAGGERTY SUE.**  
 In No. 2 court room the case of the Providence Milling company against Dr. William Haggerty was tried and went to the jury at adjournment. Attorney E. C. Newcomb represented the doctor and Attorney C. W. Dawson appeared for the plaintiff. In June, 1913, the society of the Lackawanna County Agricultural society took place at the Driving park and one of the attractions was the Myrtle Peak combination. Dr. Haggerty was a stockholder of the society and one of the attractions in the contract with the Peak combination was that the society should provide board and stabling for their horses and have the horses fed. Dr. Haggerty in the name of the society went to the Providence Milling company and ordered from Charles Maynard \$66.22 worth of feed, oats, straw, etc. Mr. Maynard is now trying to collect the money. The agricultural society became insolvent and did not pay the bill and Mr. Maynard wants to make Dr. Haggerty responsible for it. The matter was taken and the meeting adjourned.

**FOR THE DEAF MUTES.**  
**Fair Is Being Conducted by St. Luke's Church Organization.**  
 A fair for the benefit of deaf mute mission work is in progress in the new building next to the old one on the corner of Washington and Erie streets, being conducted by the Deaf Mute guild and the Penn club of St. Luke's Episcopal church. The fair will terminate tonight. The former organization is composed of deaf mutes and the latter of children, and the object of each is deaf mute missionary work. The two organizations are being assisted by F. H. Coston and Miss Nellie Stevens.

On sale are fancy articles, Easter novelties and light refreshments. Those who are providing at the tables are Misses Gussie Harper, Harriet Eynon, Mamie Calia, Mary Oliver and Elizabeth Jeremiah, of the Deaf Mute guild, and the young officers of the Deaf Mute club: President, Roswell McMillen; vice-president, Louise Daventport and Beatrice Morris; secretary, Clarence Osland, and treasurer, James McGee. Rev. M. Koehler, of Philadelphia, and formerly of this city, a deaf mute clergyman of the Episcopal church, is expected to be present at the fair today.
