Some of the other specialties were raised, notably Colorado Fuel and Iron and Tennessee Coal and Iron, the former selling off 2 1/2 to 2 3/4, and the latter 1/4 to 2 1/4 on reports that the earnings of both companies were falling off in consequence of dull trade.
