



Railroad Earnings Increasing and Efforts New York, June 12 .- Gold to the amount of \$2,200,000 will be shipped abroad on the transatiantic steamships salling tomorrow. Before noon today four large foreign banking houses notified the Sub-Treasury officials that they would require gold for export. They were Lazard Freres, who took \$1.250 000; L. von Hoffman & Co., \$500,000; Heidelbach, Ickelheimer & Co., \$250,000, and Ladenburg, Thaiman & Co., \$250,020, Of this, \$1,500,000 was taken in coin.

This large shipment of gold was not unexpected, and consequently did not

It was the first gold withdrawn from the sub-Treasury except to fill specie contracts in several months, and therefore attracted more attention and comment than recent shipments, as the exporters are supposed to have begun to send abroad the first of many villions of dollars.

Before the gold was withdrawn the posted rates of foreign exchange were advanced 14 cent to 4.881/664.891/6 for long and short, respectively. At this rate it is profitable to ship gold.
