WEST SIDE EVENTS.

Men Who, It is Alleged, Robbed Joseph Vandover Are Under Arrest.

On June 1, at night, two men accosted Joseph Vandover in Saddle place, near Washburn street. They asked him for ten cents. This he gave and the men went for beer, drinking the same. A few minutes later Vandover, who himself was partly drunk, was requested to produce another dime. Again he responded. Then in kindness to the gifts the two men jumped upon their victim and while one held him the other freed Vandover of his dime.

The names of the two men were given to Alderman John and a warrant was issued for the arrest of Anthony Terney and Thomas Whalen, both of the Keyser valley neighborhood. Last Tuesday a police officer picked up Terney while the latter was suffering from delirium tremens on Luzerne street. He was lodged in the station house and since that day he has raved and suffered from the dread condition.

Nothing could be done with him until his partner could be captured. Last evening Constable Timothy James went to Keyser valley and arrested Whalen. He, with a score of friends, entered the station house at 11 o'clock. Alderman John was summoned and was ready to proceed with the hearing when Dr. P. J. Toyland was called to examine Terney. He found his condition such as to unfit him for a hearing and the case was continued until Monday night.

Whalen entered bail in the sum of \$500 for highway robbery and \$200 for assault and battery. Patrick Hoffman qualified as bondsman. He and Whalen's other friends say they will prosecute Constable James for tripping Whalen while in the act of arresting him.

HAND, FOSTER AND JONES. These three boys, whose escapades were noted in Wednesday's Tribune, are now regularly charged with theft by Lieutenant Thomas Williams, of the West Side precinct. Warrants for their arrest were issued yesterday from the office of Alderman Blair. The names given are Lemuel Jones, of Washburn street, and Robert Foster, of Luzerne street. Young Hand has been arrested. The other two boys have disappeared from home since last Wednesday, the day of the Tribune's publication of the item. Their whereabouts are unknown to their parents.

Young Hand has before him a long case. He is about 12 years of age. Jones is the barber's apprentice. He is 16 years old. Foster is a boy of 15 years.

LEAGUE OFFICERS NOMINATED. Jackson street near Main avenue was nearly blocked last evening by two wagons, one for serving lunch, the other to exhibit mummies. These petrified bodies were embalmed at numerous periods from Adam, B. C., to the Scranton ball club. A. D. Five times ten cents was charged to see the "mummy exhibition." The show wagon was a covered affair, the size of a small house. The sides and roof were painted in the fashion of a modern art poster with incidental grafting of mummy presentments.

LEAGUE OF MEN NOMINATED. The West Side Republican League met last evening and nominated the following officers: Charles E. Oliver, president; W. A. Phillips, first vice-president; Simon Thomas, second vice-president; William Campton, John Hughes, recording secretary; J. H. Morgan, financial secretary; William Connors, treasurer. Election will be in July. President Oliver presided and the meeting was well attended.

PATRICK DOUD SERIOUSLY HURT. Patrick Doud, a miner at the Continental mines, was badly injured yesterday by a fall of top coal. He was removed to the Moses Taylor hospital in the mine ambulance. Last night his condition was considered very serious. The injuries consist of a terribly crushed left leg and bruises upon the body. Doud is 32 years of age and is unmarried. He lives on the West Side.

SOUTH SIDE NEWS.

Board of Trade Meeting Takes Up the Use of Cherry Street by the D. & H. Railroad Company.

There was an interesting meeting of the South Side board of trade last night at Storr's hall on Alder street. Mr. P. Judge, the president, introduced the most important matter for consideration. He said that numerous complaints have been lodged with him concerning the inaction of the Delaware and Hudson Railroad company in neglecting to comply with the provision of the ordinance requiring the removal of the station platform from Cherry street. A motion was passed that Secretary Donahue be instructed to communicate with Mayor Bailey and ask that steps be taken to have the ordinance enforced.

The matter is of importance to the rights of pedestrians and bicyclists on Mattois street was commented upon and the secretary was instructed to send a communication to the proper authority requesting that the policemen on duty near Mattois street be given strict orders to arrest any bicyclist using the sidewalk, which is very much too narrow at present for the convenience of the people traveling to and from the central city by this route.

John Scheuer, Jr., who has always been an enthusiastic member of the board and has labored arduously in the interest of the South Side by giving his time and attention to matters concerning the public, reported on the sewer question. He had had the assurance that Mayor Bailey will send a message to council recommending the urgent need of sewers on this side. The board of health has declared itself very positively on the necessity of a sewer for this section. Mr. Scheuer expressed himself as having personal knowledge that the people who need the sewer the most are the ones who are most opposed to it. D. P. Murray and George Scheuer discussed the question and their suggestions were very timely.

It was the unanimous sentiment that the board should go on record in commendation of the good work already done and in progress under the supervision of the councilmen in expediting the ward appropriations. Mr. Judge said inasmuch as the board has criticized the actions in the past it is just and right that credit should be given when it is deserved. He testified to the excellent work of street repairing in the Twentieth ward, and the other members had something to say in a similar strain about the other wards.

There was a motion agreed to that the board co-operate in the celebration of Fourth of July with the committee now preparing for the event. Mr. Judge recommended to have an interesting report on parks at the next meeting. E. R. Conley and John T. Brown were appointed an auditing committee to prepare their report by the next meeting if possible and not later than the August meeting.
