Whalen entered bail in the sums of \$500 for highway robbery and \$200 for assault and battery. Patrick Heffren qualified as bondsmen. He and Whalen's other friends say they will prosecute Constable Jones for tripping Whalen while in the act of arresting him.

Board of Trade Meeting Takes Up the Use of Cherry Street by the D. & H. Railroad Company.

There was an interesting meeting of the South Side board of trade last night at Storr's hall on Alder street. M. P. Judge, the president, introduced the most important matter for considera-Miss Alice Wicks and Evan E. Lewis tion. He said that numerous complaints will be wedded on June 24 at the home have been lodged with him concerning the inaction of the Delaware and Hudson Railroad company in neglecting to comply with the provisions of the ordinance requiring the removal of the station platform from Cherry street. A motion was passed that Secretary Donaboe be instructed to communicate with Mayor Balley and ask that steps be

taken to have the ordinance enforced-The matter of the disregard of the rights of pedestrians by bicyclists on Mattes street was commented upon and the secretary was instructed to send a communication to the proper authority requesting that the policemen on duty near Mattes street be given strict orders to agrest any bievelist using the sidewalk, which is very much too narrow at present for the convenience of the pcople traveling to and from the central city by this route.

John Scheuer, jr., who has always been an enthusiastic member of the board and has labored arduously in the interest of the South Side by giving his time and attention to matters conceraing the public, reported on the sewer ouestion. He had had the assurance that Mayor Balley will send a message to councils recommending the urgent need of sewers on this side. The board of health has declared itself very pointedly on the necessity of a sewer for this section. Mr. Storr expressed himself as having personal knowledge that the people who need the sewer the most are the ones who are most opposed to it. D. P. Murray and George Scheur discussed the question and their suggestions were very timely.

It was the unanimous sentiment that the board should go on record in commendation of the good work already done and in progress under the supervision of the councilmen in expending the ward appropriations. Mr. Judge said inasmuch as the board has criticized the solons in the past it is just and right that credit should be given when it is deserved. He testified to the excellent work of street repairing in the Twentieth ward, and the other members had something to say in a similar strain about the other wards.
