Found with His Skull Crushed in the Briggs Mine.

Matthew Moran, a young man of 25 years, was killed while at work in Briggs mine yesterday afternoon at 1.30 o'clock. Moran was driving a mule attached to cars along a narow passage. He was alone and the exact manner in which

he met death will never be known. Workmen heard him scream and when assistance came he was found on the side of the cars with his skull crushed. He lived only a few minutes. The body was taken to the home of his

It will Be Held in the Bicycle Club House.


The High school alumni will hold their annual meeting this evening at the rooms of the Scranton Bleycle club on North Washington avenue. At the business meeting, which begins


at 8.30 o'clock, Miss Leah Heath is expected to introduce a proposition, which if accepted by the alumni will dispense with the annual banquet.
