France and Russin Agree Upon a Plan to Nullify British Influence.

London, June 28 .- France has open the expected diplomatic campaign against Great Britain by presenting a ommunication to Lord Salisbury brough Baron de Courcel, the French ador, proposing the termin of the British occupation of Egypt with in two years subsequent to the neu tralization of Egypt, no one power to exercise an armed protectorate over the country without the assent of the others. This form of action, of which much is certain to be heard in the future, has the support of Russia and is the subject of active negotiations

between France and the other powers. It is understood that Lord Salisbury with good reason, relies upon Germany Austria and Italy to back Great Britain in prolonging the negotiations as to practically defeat the Russian-French
